If one had to synthesize Romantic Love in single words, the natural progression might be music, candlelight, hearts, flowers, cupids, and valentines. Italia, being the land of romantic music and heart-stirring vistas, counts among its ancient roots the universal symbol of love, the Roman god Cupid, the son of Venus, a favorite of the Renaissance Masters. Cupid, otherwise known as the adorable, sculpted Putti, was used profusely to decorate the treasure trove of beautiful architecture left for us. What greater symbol of star-crossed love, than that of Romeo and Juliet? Where else could you experience anything more romantic than hearing a melodious tenor's voice, rebounding off the still waters and facades of ancient, beautiful palazzos, as you glide through the narrow, back canals of Venice on a warm moonlit night in the most romantic mode of transportation ever devised, the gondola?

Yet for all these very romantic credentials, Italy can only probably claim half of the credit for this day dedicated to love. Certainly this celebration owes its name and its origin to Italy's pagan roots. During mid-February the Romans celebrated the Lupercian Festival of Fertility, where the youth would choose mates for a year. When a majority of these matches turned into marriages, they were regarded as an important cornerstone of Rome's empire building period. Later, at the height of the Empire, about 269, the Emperor Claudius needed to raise large armies in order



to protect the far flung empire. When Claudius deduced that the reason he was not raising the numbers of soldiers he needed because the men were reluctant to leave their wives, he outlawed marriage. At this time, Christianity was taking root. Many started to go to Bishop Valentine to commit to their love and asked to be married secretly. Claudius jailed and condemned to death Bishop Valentine for his disobedience. While in prison, he was visited often by the jailer's daughter. Legend says that he fell in love. On the day of his death, February 14, 269, he wrote notes of encouragement and loyalty to her and some of his followers. He signed these notes "Love from your Valentine". With his martyrdom, he was elevated and became St. Valentine.

Many of the customs still practiced today for Valentine's Day however, evolved in Europe, most notably in the England of Henry the VIII. In Wales, wooden spoons carved with symbols of hearts, keys, and keyholes were given to the objects of boys' attractions, meaning "You unlock my heart". The heart was considered the seat of all emotion and the organ that sustained life. During the Middle Ages, young men and women would draw names from a bowl and (continued on page 11)

Member Profile

Passione!

When in the presence of **Maria DeNitto**, one senses a passion for life, for family, for work, and for the IACC. All of these mean so much to her and she demonstrates her dedication not only with words, but with actions. Maria and Luigi have created for themselves a good life, one based on family, work, and friendships.

For Maria and Luigi, life began in Italy, in the towns of Ariola and Montesarchio, both outside of Naples. Maria arrived in New York as a young girl in 1956, accompanied by her father, Pasquale Tirino, and her brothers, John and Tony, her mother, Elvira, having arrived 6 months previously. The Tirino family settled in the South End of Albany. Maria attended St Anthony's School and later Cardinal McCloskey High School, where she earned her commercial diploma, graduating as a stenographer. Maria was employed at the State Bank of Albany, which she left when she and her family returned to Italy on vacation. She later worked for several years as a stenographer in a methadone clinic in Albany. She then attended the Colonna Beauty School, where she trained to pursue a career as a hairdresser, a career that she loved until necessity called her in another direction.

We leave Maria at this time to catch up with the life of Luigi DeNitto who arrived in New York in 1971. While in Italy, Luigi served in the Italian army and attended college at the Naples State University where he majored in foreign languages, specifically, English, French, and German. His intention was to become a teacher of languages, but somehow love got in the way, love in the name of Maria Tirino. Maria and Luigi communicated for two years through letters. When Maria and her family returned to Italy for a vacation, Luigi met them at the airport. Two weeks later, in August of 1970, they were married by the Justice of the Peace in Airola. Maria returned with her family to Albany and Luigi got called into the army. It was not until April of 1971 that Luigi was able to be reunited with Maria in Albany. On July 3, 1971, they were married at St Anthony's Church. Luigi initially worked for Fuller Brush Company and then later for a construction firm where he helped build the South End Mall. In 1979 the opportunity arrived for Luigi to purchase Fiorello Importing on Western Avenue. Several years later he requested the help of Maria. Maria left her position as hairdresser to work to develop a successful family business.



Maria's love for children and family is evident and strong. Their son, Mimmo, was born in 1979 and their daughter, Anna Rita, in 1983. Mimmo is a manager in Fiorello Importing and will eventually take over the business. Anna Rita has earned her master's degree in Special Education and Secondary Education and is currently working as a kindergarten teacher at Henry Johnson Charter School. Maria maintains deep relationships with her close and extended family and her many friends.

Maria's love for the IACC is one of long standing. Maria and Luigi, her parents, and her two brothers, were all charter members. Maria's father worked tirelessly to improve the building and grounds at the IACC and earned the distinction of having the pavilion named in his honor. As current chairperson of the pavilion committee, Maria has demonstrated her devotion to her father's memory and to the family's dedication to the IACC. Maria's many accomplishments for the IACC include the institution of Friday Family Fun Nights at the pavilion and involvement at the Columbus Day Festivals and the annual Festas. As she says, "My heart is in that place and I feel very proud of that." Maria has served the IACC in so many capacities, but she always and sincerely displays a modesty in emphasizing that all successes are a product of many people working together for a common goal. When Maria loves something, she does so with passion and dedication, truly a trait we can all admire.



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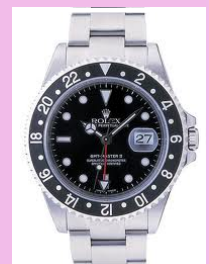

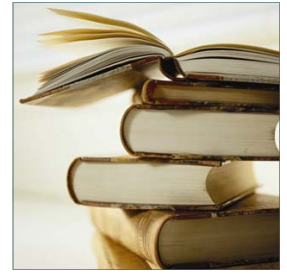

“Family is family, like it or not”

The IACC Book Club’s Next Selection is a Novel about Two Italian-American Families

The next meeting of the IACC

Book Club will be on **Wednesday, March 21st**, at 7:00 PM in the Boardroom. The book to be discussed is *The Spaghetti Set: Family Served Italian Style* by Rose Marie Boyd, published in 2011. The novel is set post World War 11 in New Jersey first focuses on relationships within two families, and then the relationship between the families after a son from one and a daughter from the other meet and fall in love.

The Camara family was Italian-born while the Matteos were born in America of Italian immigrant parents. Part of the conflict in the story is related to the different stages of Americanization of these families. Each family is beset with multiple issues which only get worse when multiplied by two. How the two families cope with the absurdities of love, intimacy, and life unfolds in a true comedy of errors, complete with laughter and tears.

The author, born Rosa Maria Maisto, was part of a large, extended family and grew up in the Italian section of Trenton, NJ. Her mother, Emilia, was born in Sicily and had 17 siblings. Othello, her father, was born in the United States, but the family was originally from Naples. Othello was one of 10 children. As you can imagine, growing up and experiencing the idiosyncrasies of so many family members provided real life experiences from which Rose Marie (Rosa Maria) could draw upon for her imaginative novel. An interesting aspect of this novel is the heavy use of Italian vocabulary in the narrative.

The meanings of some of the words are self-evident, while the rest become clear in the context of the sentences in which they appear. For the non-Italian speaker, the novel is also a language lesson.

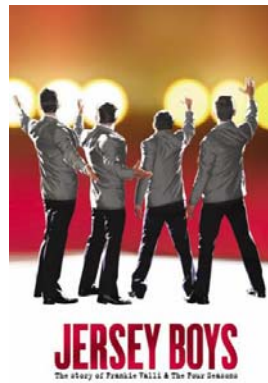

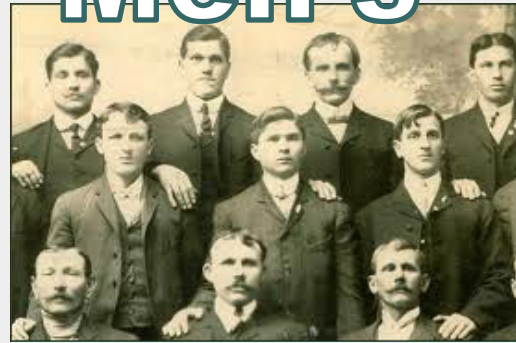

STRAWBERRY SHORTCUT CAKE



Ingredients:

1 (18.25-ounce) box strawberry cake mix
3 cups fresh strawberries, sliced
2 Tablespoons cognac
1/4 cup sugar
1 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup confectioners' sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 (3-ounce) package strawberry flavored gelatin (recommended: Jell-O)
Fresh strawberries, for garnish

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F

Follow cake directions as written on cake mix box.

Remove from oven and cool cake completely. Meanwhile, in a medium bowl, combine strawberries, cognac and sugar. Let macerate 20 minutes. Invert and release cake onto a decorative platter.

Whip cream with confectioners' sugar and vanilla at medium-high speed until it reaches stiff peaks. Do not over whip.

Mix gelatin as directed on box. Refrigerate gelatin mix, but do not let it harden. It should cool to a liquid consistency.

Using a straw, poke holes all over the cake. Pour gelatin into holes and spread over the top of the cake.

Spread layer of macerated strawberries on top of cake. Spread layer of whipped cream on top of the strawberries, making pretty swirls and ripples. Garnish with fresh strawberries. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours.

pin that name on their sleeve for one week. Hence we now say “You are wearing your heart on your sleeve.” During Victorian times, the love seat had 2 sections and was often S-shaped. In this way, a courting couple could sit together, but not too close. The ladies of this era developed some amusing little romantic beliefs: Pick a dandelion that has gone to seed. Blow hard, count the seeds remaining on the stem and that is the number of children you will have. Think of five or six names of persons you might marry. Start twisting the stem of an apple while reciting the names. You will marry the person whose name you are saying when the stem breaks.

To England again goes the honor for the tradition of sending beautiful cards and poetic verses to a loved one on Valentine’s Day. The oldest Valentine is still in existence, a love poem from the Duke of Orleans to his wife, written in 1415, while he was imprisoned in the Tower of London. Victorian cards were beautiful works of art and sentimental poetry. Flower giving on this day again goes back to St Valentine, who was supposed to have had red roses sent with his loving notes of good-byes. Since then, giving flowers to a loved one is part of the tradition of this holiday. Did you know that when you give a red rose you are expressing a deep passionate love? A pink rose tells of admiration and joy. A yellow rose expresses happiness and warmth. A white rose signifies purity and innocence. Tulips indicate a perfect love. Peruvian lilies denote undying devotion.

The over-the-top American way of celebrating Valentine’s Day is spreading like wild fire. Until very recently, Italy celebrated it as a special day to manifest love simply by saving that day to announce happy events of the heart such as engagements, a wedding, the baptism of a child, and, of course, to wish their loved ones, family, and friends a happy SAINT Valentine’s Day. On the other hand, in Italy, a bouquet of mimosa flowers is given to every woman in one’s life, from your lover to your nonna, on the festa that celebrates women, the International Day of Women, Il Giorno Delle Femmine, celebrated on March 8.



The roots of this holiday falling yearly on February 14th are planted firmly with St Valentine. However, in beautiful Italy, the country that enjoys a reputation as the land of the Latin lover and romance, this will not suffice too much longer. It won’t be long before the signoras and signorinas will expect cards, candy, flowers, to be wined and dined, and to enjoy all the little manifestations of this day... American style!
