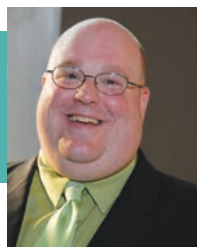

Islands of Umbria

Lake Trasimeno is half-way along the Italian peninsula between Rome and Firenze. It is the fourth largest lake in the country. There are three islands in Lake Trasimeno: Isola Polvese (the largest), Isola Maggiore (the only one with a permanent population), and Isola Minore (privately owned). The history of the lake and its islands encompasses the Etruscans, Romans, and the Umbrian people. The Romans eventually dominated, settling and incorporating the region into their greater empire, as they were to do across much of the Europe of the day.

Isola Polvese, situated in the southeastern part of Lake Trasimeno, is the largest of the lake's three islands. The area is of particular historical and naturalistic interest. This island was the site of the Battle of Lago Trasimeno in the Second Punic War, in which the Carthaginians under Hannibal routed the Roman Army in 217 BC. Today the island is known as a scientific-didactic park, part of Trasimeno Regional Park. It is the only island with an Environmental Certification in Italy. It hosts educational seminars and training, instructing other municipalities in using best practices of environmental sustainability criteria through organic farming, Phyto depuration plants, energy-saving, and composting systems.



Isola Maggiore

Isola Maggiore is the second-largest island (59 acres) on Lake Trasimeno and is the only inhabited island on the lake, with a current population of 35. Once a small fishing village, the settlement dates back to the early Middle Ages. In the 12th century, the Church of Saint Michael the Archangel was built, and housed frescoes made between the 13th and the 16th centuries. The island's only town reached its height of fame and fortune in the 14th century after a Franciscan monastery was established there in 1328. The Friars once hosted St. Francis of Assisi on the island throughout an entire Lenten season. Most of the town's buildings date from this period.

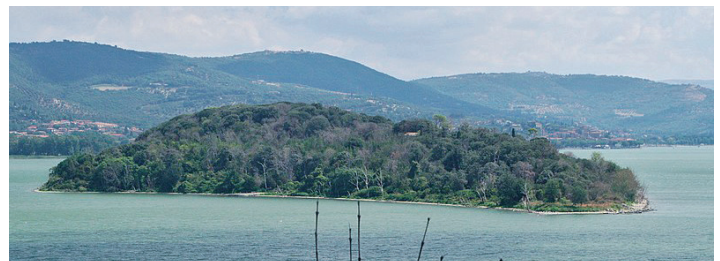
The Guglielmi Castle

The Guglielmi Castle was built in the 1880s on the monastery site but has since fallen into disrepair. From February 1944 until June 1944, the castle was used as an internment camp for Jews and political prisoners sent there for their safety by the Fascist Prefect of Perugia Armando Rocchi, who was under German instructions to send them instead to a concentration camp. After the Fascist authorities left Perugia and the British arrived at Sant'Arcangelo, the prisoners were eventually rowed to safety by the island's fishermen. A monument has been erected in the open space next to the Lace Museum. The rescue was organized by the island's priest, don Ottavio Posta. The castle was under renovation to become a luxury resort/spa in 2010, but the company behind the project declared bankruptcy.

Isola Minore, known until the twentieth century as l'isoletta, "the little island", is the smallest of the three islands. Isola Minore is covered by woodland, with pines and holm oaks protecting numerous cormorants' nesting sites. In the Middle Ages, it had a large population. However, during the fifteenth century, the inhabitants transferred en masse to the mainland to escape from brigands' depredations. Subsequently, it has been home only to the occasional hermit. Today the island is in private ownership and uninhabited. □

OUR LADY OF TINDARI

Upon the closing of St. Anthony's Church in downtown Albany, Sylvester R. Coppolino arranged to have the statue of Our Lady of Tindari moved uptown to a shrine along the wall in what was then St. Margaret Mary's Church (now known as All Saints Catholic Church). Until his death in 1987, he would schedule a mass to be dedicated annually in commemoration of her September 8th Feast Day. His daughters, Santa Coppolino Pasquini and Ann Coppolino Sweeney, continued to honor Our Lady of Tindari and the Sodality in his memory with a mass held at the church in

early September followed by a luncheon at the Italian American Community Center. Usually, there are 50 – 70 people in attendance, many of whom lived in the old South End/Grand Street area and still have fond memories of their parents, grandparents, and old St. Anthony's Church. The event this year is on September 11, 2022 at All Saints with a 10:30 am mass followed by Sunday Brunch at the IACC immediately afterward. Call Maria Marchio at 518 438-9067 for reservation info.

Arrivederci **Alitalia** ... *Benvenuto* **ITA**

It was July 1960, and this 12-year-old was speechless. Wow! JFK airport and the beautiful Alitalia terminal was quite a show. Our group wished safe travels to my Uncle Chris and his then 84-year-old mother as they boarded their Alitalia flight. 1960 also ushered in the Rome Summer Olympics and the pinnacle of Alitalia's profitability and success as an international air carrier. The year saw Alitalia carry over one million passengers, introduce more jets into its fleet, and move to a new home at Rome's Leonardo da Vinci-Fiumicino Airport.

Over the years, Alitalia's history as Italy's national carrier was full of financial struggles, employee strikes, and other damaging events, forcing it to cease operations after 74 years of service. On October 15, 2021, the airline flew its final flight from Cagliari, Italy, to Rome. After that, Alitalia officially ceased operations and handed the baton to newcomer ITA Airways, which stands for Italian Air Transport. The country's new flag carrier ITA took Alitalia's place with new gates, airplanes, and connecting network, flying its first route from Milan Linate Airport to Bari International Airport in southern Italy.

Alitalia as a brand began in 1946, one year after World War II ended, first flying in 1947 within Italy and quickly expanding to other European countries while also opening intercontinental routes to South America. The full name of the airline was Italian International

Airlines, a joint effort between the United Kingdom through British European Airways, a precursor to British Airways, and the Italian government. Following a 1957 merger with Italy's other airline, aptly named Italian Airlines or Linee Aeree Italiane, Alitalia became Italy's numero uno. True to its name, Alitalia first flew with Italian aircraft produced by the now defunct aerospace manufacturers Fiat and Savoia-Marchetti.

The prop-driven aircraft soon gave way to the jet age. They leased American airliners. The airline's short trip fleet featured the McDonnell Douglas DC-9 and MD-80 complimented by Boeing 747s for international trips.

The arrival of the 747 was a historical moment for Alitalia, and it was the first aircraft to wear the airline's famed green, white, and red livery with an "A" shape on the tail. In addition, Alitalia was the first European airline to move into the jet age with more wide-body aircraft such as the Airbus A300, McDonnell Douglas DC-10s, and Boeing 767s. Not only was their fleet top class, they even had uniforms and plane interiors designed by Giorgio Armani.

As Italy's national airline, Alitalia was also known for flying the Pope with the papal plane using the flight number AZ4000, better known (shown here) as Shepherd One.

While the Italian tourist and leisure industry surged to record numbers, the airline struggled with profitability post-1960. As a state-owned airline, Alitalia could always depend on the government to keep it flying. However, when Italy joined the European Union in 2006, the charter forbade government financial support for such endeavors.

The 2000s saw serious discussions about Alitalia's future, and the Italian government was forced to sell its stake in the airline. The airline was offered to bidders in 2007 but that yielded no results. Air France-KLM (Netherlands) Group, the parent company of Air France and KLM and several smaller European airlines, then offered to buy the struggling carrier.

The Italian government, not wanting to lose its flag carrier, continued to prop up its airline via emergency loans in violation of European Union rules. The end was inevitable.

The third attempt in two years to sell the airline came after the Air France-KLM Group deal collapsed with a new investors group forming the Compagnia Aerea Italiana (CAI) to purchase the airline, despite heavy pushback from labor unions. This updated version of Alitalia began operations in 2009, with Air France-KLM coming back into the picture, taking a 25% stake from the Italian government.

This version of Alitalia quickly began differentiating itself from its former self, leasing aircraft instead of purchasing them with the short-trip fleet consisting of the Airbus A330 and the Boeing 777 comprising the airline's long-haul fleet. Labor contracts stalled, layoffs began, and it was not long before Alitalia was plagued with issues ranging from union strikes to underperforming subsidiaries and even a sting operation that saw Alitalia employees arrested for theft.



With bankruptcy looming in 2013, Alitalia again restructured with the Italian government seizing control. Under pressure from the European Union, the Italian government was again forced to reduce its financial liability. As a result, Alitalia obtained a new investor in 2015, Eithad Airways, which would take a 49% stake in the airline, and Alitalia-Eithad was born.

With a new investor in tow, Alitalia began cost-cutting measures but again faced employee outrage due to planned job and route cuts. Finally, the airline started bankruptcy proceedings, and the government announced Alitalia would be auctioned. Meanwhile, another airline positioned itself to become the new Italian flag carrier, the aptly named Air Italy.

Rebranded from Meridiana, a regional Italian airline, Air Italy was jointly owned by a private company, Alisarda, and Qatar Airways. The airline chose Milan as its main hub ceding Rome to Alitalia. Long-haul flights from Milan to New York began in June 2018, with a quick expansion to Asian routes.

Financially ruined by the grounding of the Boeing 737 Max and without the Italian government as a benefactor, Air Italy dissolved in early 2020, giving back complete control and all its debt to the government. The government, in turn, forced Alitalia to absorb these services and debt. Once again, the desperate Italian government would seek outside investors, with European, North American, and Asian airlines expressing interest in Alitalia.

Among those interested were UK low-cost carrier EasyJet, Irish low-cost carrier Ryanair, The Lufthansa Group, Delta Air Lines, China Eastern Airlines, and the Italian railway group, Ferrovie dello Stato Italiane. However, one after the other, these suitors dropped their interest, and the Italian government re-nationalized the airline on March 17, 2020, during the coronavirus pandemic. Despite bailouts from the state, the pandemic and subsequent lockdown of Italy took the ultimate toll on Alitalia, forcing it to decide to close the airline and launch a new one.

When the airline ceased operations, its successor, *ITA-Italia Trasporto Aereo*, took its place. Talks between the European Commission and Italy over Alitalia and *ITA* began in March 2021, with Rome designating three billion euros (\$3.6 billion) to establish the new flag carrier. Initially, *ITA* was slated to begin operations in April 2021, but lengthy discussions over the number of Alitalia airport gates which would be sold to other carriers delayed the birth of the new carrier. Another part of the negotiations focused on confirming *ITA*'s independence from Alitalia in order to ensure it did not inherit the billions of debts the old carrier owed to the state.

At the end of the discussions, negotiators agreed to allow *ITA* to keep 85% of gate slots at Linate (Milan) and 43% at Fiumicino (Rome). Also under negotiation was Alitalia's brand and its loyalty program, MilleMiglia. *ITA* successfully purchased the Alitalia brand, but the loyalty program remains unpurchased, and customers are stuck with over five million useless MilleMiglia miles. In addition, *ITA* will have its own *VOLARE* rewards program.

The successor acquired fifty-two of Alitalia's aircraft, seven being wide-bodies, and has plans to expand to

105 with leased and purchased eco-friendly Airbus aircraft. As for the over 11,000 Alitalia workers, about two thousand were hired to work for *ITA*, which has 2,800 employees. The rest of their employees came from outside Alitalia. The company plans to add 1,000 new jobs in 2022 and reach 5,750 employees by 2025.

ITA launched with fifty-nine routes to forty-four destinations. *ITA* plans to increase its routes to 74 in 2022 and 89 by 2025, while destinations are expected to increase to 58 in 2022 and 74 by 2025.

On launch day, *ITA* introduced new plane regalia, which included a light blue paint scheme representing unity, cohesion, and pride of the nation, as well as homage to Italy's national sports team, which wears sky blue during competitions. In addition, on the tail will be the Italian tricolor of red, white, and green.

ITA will focus its operation on Rome's Leonardo da Vinci International Airport and Milan Linate Airport, establishing itself as a "reference airline" for business and leisure travelers. The carrier also plans to target the North American market, with flights from Rome to New York launching on November 4th.

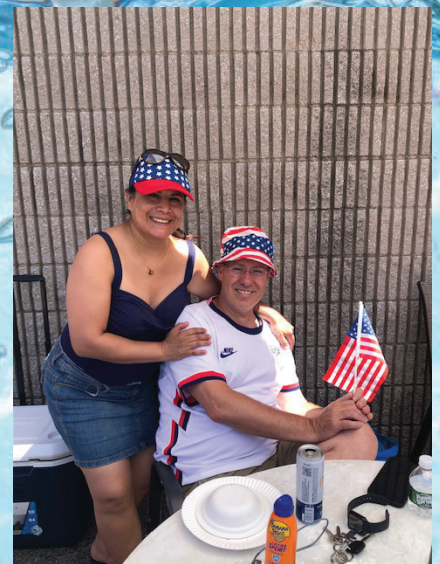
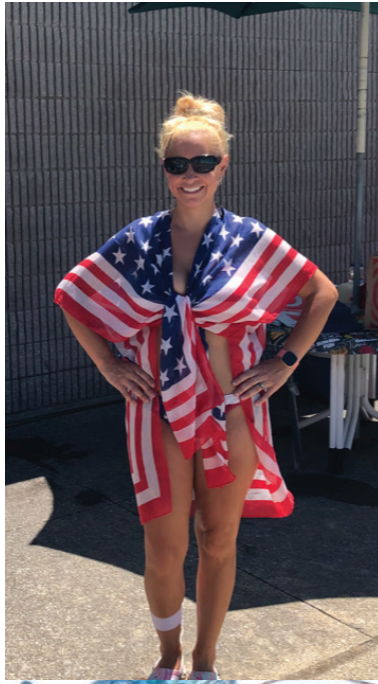
ITA has set up a loyalty program called Volare, effective October 15th, which is split into four levels: smart, plus, premium, and executive. Customers can use accrued points for any flight in *ITA*'s system. According to *ITA* executives, the company plans to join a major international alliance, though it has not stated which one it prefers. Alitalia was aligned with the SkyTeam alliance, comprised of carriers like Delta, Air France, and KLM. However, *ITA* chairperson Alfredo Altavilla said, "*ITA* can't be a stand-alone carrier forever," and they are open to all options. □

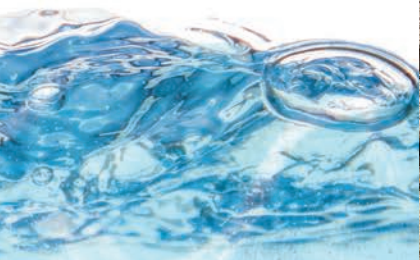

Mangia Bene, Viva Bene

Cucumber & Tomato Salad



The best part of this time of year is the homegrown vegetables. Whether grown in your back yard, purchased at a farm stand or even freshly picked at a farm, homegrown vegetables are the best. The tomatoes are sweet, cucumbers have a crunch and the basil... wow, what can I say about the basil, that smell; it is the smell of my childhood. Almost every night in August and September, my grandmother would include a cucumber and tomato salad with dinner. Her recipe is fairly easy, but it is so good.



Prep Time: 5 minutes

Ingredients

- 3 homegrown plum tomatoes (any type of tomatoes will do)
- 2 homegrown cucumbers
- 1/2 of a medium size red onion
- 10-12 fresh basil leaves (you can never have too many)
- 3/4 cup of red wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup of extra virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 tablespoon of dried oregano

Instructions

1. Remove the skin from the cucumbers, core the tomatoes, and slice the tomatoes first in half and then in four strips. Cut the cucumbers into slices. Cut the onions into medium sized julienne strips.
2. In a large mixing bowl, add the cut cucumbers, tomatoes, and onions. Add the basil by ripping it into pieces. If you cut it, it loses flavor. Add the salt and dried oregano.
3. Add the vinegar and give it a good mix. Then add the olive oil and mix it again. Let it sit for about 15 minutes to let all the flavors meld together. Taste it and adjust the salt as needed.

Serve it with a piece of crusty Italian bread for dipping in the dressing when you're finished.

Proper bathing attire required. No cut-off jeans in the pool.

Clothes and towels are not to be hung on or over the fence.

IACC is not responsible for lost or stolen articles in pool area.

NO running or jumping, profanity, horseplay, or pets permitted.

NO glassware permitted in pool area.

Children under age 12 MUST be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult at all times in pool area.

NO radios, cassettes, or CD players in the pool area.

ALL babies and small children not toilet trained MUST wear a swim diaper at all times.

Children using flotation devices must be accompanied by an adult in the water.

Children using flotation devices are allowed in the shallow end of the pool ONLY.

No smoking in the Pool area.

Guests must be accompanied by a member and must register with the lifeguard on duty.



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
