# 'BIRTH CERTIFICATES' - NOT!!

I have written about this subject before, but as more and more descendants of Sicilian and Italian immigrants strive to identify their roots, I see increasing requests for their ancestors' "birth certificates". And I can't say it often enough or clearly enough: in the 1800's and early 1900's, Sicilian and Italian families did not receive birth certificates when their children were born!

On the day of a child's birth, or a day or two later, the child's father ('il dichiarante', the declarant or informant) or the father's representative physically carried the newborn to the 'Casa Comunale', the Town Hall, and presented it to a village official who was authorized to act as the 'Uffiziale dello Stato Civile' (Official of the Civil Status) of the town. This official might be the 'Sindaco' (mayor), 'Assessore' (Councilman), 'Segratario Comunale' (Town Secretary) or another elected or appointed official. That official took the informant's declaration before two 'testimonii' (witnesses) and had it recorded by a clerk in two large registers of 'Atti di Nascite' (Records of Birth). Of these identical registers, one was kept (to this day) in the 'Anagrafe' or town Registry Office, and one was sent to the 'Tribunale', the Magistrate of the Province in which the town is located. This second copy was then filed permanently in the Provincial Archives.

Years later, if the child or his family needed proof of his birth (say for a marriage) they would go to the Town Hall and ask for the information. The clerk would look up the Birth Record and copy key information from it onto an 'Estratto Certificato dello Atto di Nascita': a Certified Extract of the Record of Birth. When uninformed descendants ask for a 'birth certificate', often this extract is what they receive. Translated, an example reads thusly:

Certified Extract of the Record of Birth

From the 1873 Register of Births, Part 1, Record 195 Surname: Aquilina <u>Given Name</u>: Gaetano

<u>Date of Birth</u>: 23 August 1873 <u>Father</u>: Calogero Aquilina <u>Mother</u>: Concetta Lombardo

Issued this day, 1 April 1897 in Serradifalco

Now, here's a complete translation of the actual Atto di Nascita:



Record 195

Gaetano Aquilina

Year 1873, day 23 of the month of August at hour 15:00 Italian Time in the Town Hall. Before me, Antonio Prizzi, Secretary of the Town of Serradifalco, Environs and Province of Caltanissetta, delegated to fulfill the function of Official of the Civil Status for the records of birth and of death by the Mayor of this Town, by act of 18 March of this year; has appeared Calogero Aquilina (son of the late Pasquale), age forty-six years, occupation sulfur miner, domiciled in Serradifalco, who has presented to me an infant of masculine sex who he declared was born at hour 17:00 Italian Time yesterday, of his wife Concetta Lombardo, daughter of the living Giuseppe, according to the declarant domiciled in their home located in this Town of Serradifalco at Via Crucillà number 9, to which son he gave the name of Gaetano. This declaration was made in the presence of Sebastiano Valenti (son of the late Vincenzo), age 28 years, and of Calogero Diforti (son of the late Moise) age 30 years; both sulfur miners residing in this Town, witnesses chosen by the declarant, and after having been read this record, inscribed on two original registers, it is signed only by me, the declarant and the witnesses having said that they don't know how to write. [signed] Antonio Prizzi

Note that the extract not only leaves out many important details, it gives the <u>wrong</u> date of birth! The birth was reported on 23 August 1873, but the record itself states that the birth was 'yesterday', or 22 August 1873'. The clerk who filled out the extract made a common mistake and assumed the birth date was the same as the record date. The extract is a secondary record, the *Atto di Nascita* is a primary record and gives the correct date. The moral: don't settle for an extract!

# Armand Marando

hen seventeen year old Armand Marando embarked from Italy on the ship Cristoforo Colombo bound for New York City and northward to Troy, he was intending an adolescent adventure. He still maintains that he just wanted to "look

around". Apparently, he liked what he saw, because he has remained in the area for 63 years and counting, putting down deep roots and building a rich family life, rewarding career, and community connections.



Armand's father, Ferdinando (Fred) Marando had come to the U.S. long before Armand was born, seeking employment and money making opportunities. He found just that in Troy, at the operations and grounds department of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI). For over 50 years, he worked there and traveled back to the town of Ardore in Calabria whenever he could to be with his wife, Armand's mother, who was raising Armand and his older brother, Giuseppe(Peppi) and managing the family's land and houses.

That's how Armand had the idea to come to the Capital District as a tourist. Once he was here, the adventure turned into a lifestyle. He took a job at the Bendix factory (Later, it would become Honeywell) in Green Island and attended night classes at Troy High School, while he resided with a family at Franklin Square. His English was getting better and better and his savings account was growing! On the weekends, he enjoyed the nightlife in Albany, especially when dancing was involved.



Mary Lou Romano was a third generation Italian American living with her family in Albany around that time. Mary Lou's grandparents on both sides of the family had come from the Naples area, and her mother's maiden name was Vacariello. However, the family had lost touch with the Italian relatives and her mother came from a blended family of ten. Mary Lou had grown up in Arbor Hill and attended St. Joseph's Academy on Second Street and then Vincentian Institute in the days when boys were on one floor and girls on another. By that time, the Romano family had moved to Orlando Avenue. After high school, Mary Lou began her career as a secretary and enjoyed going out with her friends to dance. Ironically, one evening at the Polish club on Sheridan Avenue, a handsome stranger asked her to dance. She said no.

Finally, Mary Lou gave in and danced a polka with the stranger. Thus began a four year courtship of Armand and Mary Lou. Dancing was a favorite

Saturday night date even after they married and Armand moved to Mary Lou's neighborhood in Albany, where they still reside today. The couple took a three month honeymoon trip to Italy where MaryLou met Armand's family for the first time. To prepare, she had studied Italian in Fulvia's class at the IACC. Even so, dialect proved to be a barrier, but it didn't matter. Armand's mother loved Mary Lou from the start and MaryLou called her Mama from the day they met. The relaxed lifestyle and warmth of the culture called them back to Italy every so often for many years until Armand's brother passed.

After three years of marriage, the Marandos started a family of their own. They traveled to Italy again

with their two sons, Michael and Joe, in 1973, so that they could meet the Italian relatives and appreciate the country and culture. 
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
# BEST OF THE BRONX DAY

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



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
