

Beginning researchers often assume that all Sicilian and Italian records repose with 'the church', and ask how churches can be contacted for the records. But there were and are two separate sets of records generally available: 1) church, or canonical, and 2) civil records of life events. It's obvious that church records are kept in church, parish, or diocesan archives, but civil records aren't. They're permanently stored in the towns of origin, with duplicates at provincial centers. Church records, some as early as the 1300's, record the administration of sacraments: battesime (baptisms), cresime (chrismation, confirmation), matrimoni (marriages), and morti (extreme unction). *Civil* records, instituted in the early 1800's by order of or inspired by Napoleon's 'civil code', give dates and details of nati (births), pubblicazioni or notificazioni (marriage banns), *matrimoni* (marriages) cittadinanzi (changes of address), and morti (deaths).

Marriage records show perhaps the greatest **differences** between church and civil records and their transformation over the decades, as well as insight to church/state politics and their effect on the public. Before the early 1800's, there were no civil records, since the church held both spiritual and worldly authority. Early church marriage records were written in Latin, as were records of other sacraments. The records were kept in sequential church registers. Each clerk had his own methods, but usually there was an index covering ten to twenty years, before each set of records. These indices would generally be roughly alphabetical by the first letter of the groom's surname. But sometimes they were alphabetical by the first letter of the groom's given name, and you must remember the Latin forms of the names: Aloysius for Luigi, Joseph for Giuseppe, Hieronymus for Giralomo, Phillipus for Filippo, etc.

No marriage 'certificates' or 'licenses' were given to the participants. Church marriage records gave the date of the marriage and reported the dates of three consecutive feastday masses at which the proposed marriage had been publicized (that is, marriage banns had been posted). Then the title and name of the officiating priest was given, followed by the name of the groom, his father, his mother and whether they were living or dead at the time of the record. Next came the same information for the bride. If either betrothed was previously widowed, that was noted. Normally, the town of the marriage was not mentioned, but rendered as 'here' or 'this land', unless one of the principals was from another town, which would be listed. The record gave names of one or two witnesses to the sacrament and stated that the couple pledged their troth and were joined in marriage before the holy church.



No ages, occupations, or detailed residences were given on church marriage records, although some men might be designated 'Mr' for 'Magister' (Master), 'D' for 'Dominus' (Don), or 'V. C.' for 'Vir Clarissimus' (most esteemed man).

When civil record-keeping was started in the early **1800's,** a record that was instituted then, and remained in use until about 1860, was the Atto Della Solenne Promessa di Celebrare il Matrimonio (Record of the Solemn Promise to Celebrate Matrimony), or what we would call a 'Civil Marriage Contract'. Though some call this a 'marriage record' it is not. These documents, in Italian, are 'split' records, where facts about the participants are listed on the left. On the right is a notation that the actual and only marriage, as reported by the pastor, took place in church on a given date. The date of the 'Promise' may be a day or two before the marriage date. The contract was filed in the permanent civil registry of the town (the Anagrafe). The marriage record, as before, was kept by the church and was the official, binding document. If the marriage never took place, the right side of the record was left blank.

The four-page civil marriage promise used from about 1820 - 1860 has much more **detail** than the church marriage record. It gives the date of the contract and of the marriage; the name, age, occupation, birthplace and residence of the groom; his

parents' names and status (living or dead); and the same information for the bride. Often the ages of the parents, if living, were also given. In addition to the names of two witnesses to the contract, the record lists all the documents in the *Allegati*, or 'attachments' to the civil matrimonial file, typically: the birth record of the groom and the bride; the death records of parents of the betrothed; death records of any previous spouses of the bride or groom; and copies of the marriage banns. Those records are held in a separate file, but sometimes the list gives actual dates of births, deaths, etc. and names of the principals. The signatures of any attendees at the contract registration who knew how to write (a relatively rare occurrence) are at the bottom of the marriage promise.

Then came the creation of a nation that did not exist **before 1860**: the 'Kingdom of Italy', which 'unified' former northern citystates and duchies. It subsumed Sicilian lands and their records, from Abruzzo and Napoli south to Messina and Palermo, while breaking the hold of the church over the administration of law. Church holdings were taken over by the state, and church marriages were no longer recognized as 'legitimate'. By 1866, this led to new Atti di Matrimonio (Civil Records of Marriage) with no mention of the church, and the requirement that whether they had been married in church or not, a couple *must* be wed in a civil ceremony for the marriage and any children resulting from it to be legitimate.

Dina Barbata

s soon as you meet Dino, you know he is a people person- una persona socievole. The sparkle in his eye seems to reflect back from his silver hair and welcoming smile. Sutino Barbato - his real name- has a complex story of a life well lived. Now, it seems, he is enjoying the sweetest part, sharing it with friends and family - a wife of 52 years, three adult children, and eight grandchildren, as well as with his friends at the Italian American Community Center.

It was a stroke of fortune for the IACC when Dino joined five years ago as an active member. Having been involved with the Sons of Italy in Schenectady, he understood service and took great joy in the fellowship and teamwork that naturally goes along with it. At the Sons of Italy, Dino, a self-professed natural born tease, liked the comradery and good humor that goes with working in the kitchen, as well as serving at banquets and parties where he could talk to people. No wonder he became the steady and faithful promoter and operator at the IACC Friday Nights at the Pavilion, every single Friday from May through September. Other members think of him in this niche. even before they remember that he also served as member of the Board of Directors for two years! For all of his service, Dino was chosen to receive the President's Award in 2017.

Although Dino has lived almost all of his adult life in Albany, his formative years were spent in Italy. He was born on a farm near Benevento, a city south of Naples on the Appian Way. It was a magically beautiful place, but the Barbato family was plagued with sorrow and struggles after the death of Dino's mother at age 33 when Dino was six years old. He remembers going to school and then being looked after by neighbors when his father took the truckloads of farm produce to the far away mountains and was away for days. At the age of 15, he went off to Milan, the fashion capital of the world,



to stay with his cousin for three years and learn tailoring, a trade which would become his lifelong profession. At age 18, he returned home. Finding no work and few prospects outside of farming, the family moved to Albany to reunite with an older brother and sister who had forged their own path from Italy to Boston and then to Albany after their mother's death, so long before.

The year was 1963 and jobs were scarce in Albany, too, but Dino took a job at Bond's Clothing Store, doing alterations. For the first time ever, he was using an electric sewing machine! It was the union boss who decided that Sutino was too long a name and coined the nickname Dino.

It stuck. By 1965, Dino was working steadily and learning English in night school. That is where he met Rosa. She was also in the garment business, working at a coat factory and sewing as many as 500 sleeves a day. A whirlwind romance lead to marriage after just three months and many happy years followed. Just two years ago, Dino and Rosa renewed their vows at their 50th Anniversary celebration at the IACC, with family and 200 guests in attendance. Dino loves to spend time with his family. Big vacations are a favorite activity and memory maker. The extended Barbato family has vacationed together in Acapulco, Mexico and in Wildwood, New Jersey where they rented 25 rooms for 75 people. They even had a team t-shirt. Dino and Rosa regularly travel to Italy to visit family there, too. Every two years, they enjoy six weeks immersed in the Mediterranean lifestyle in the presence of cousins. Back home, at the IACC, Dino finds the IACC to be a very comfortable place for dinner and socializing. He especially likes the bocce night and informal gatherings that can happen at this kind of a club. He talks about bringing in friends from the Sons of Italy to add to the more than 440 current members and he looks forward to adding new activities and improving the pavilion.


