


**Columbus Gala Dinner Dance**

# Member Profile Josephine Sano by Anna Acconi

# A Local Treasure

hen called a role model for women, Josephine Sano modestly declines the honor. As a revered teacher and an honored union leader, Josephine has lived an interesting life full of love for her family and for her profession. She describes herself instead as an independent woman who simply made decisions based on the ideals in which she passionately believed.

Born in Elmhurst, Queens in 1920, Josephine Autilio moved with her parents to Gloversville so that her mother could better cope with her emphysema. In her early years, Josephine was much influenced by her own role model, her father. A barber, John Autilio,



came to America at the age of 16, determined to learn the language and become successful. He bought a copy of the *New York Times* and used it to teach himself to read and write English. His desire to learn was so strong that each day he concentrated on incorporating a new word into his vocabulary. At dinner each night, a dictionary was placed on the table, so that a new word could be looked up, understood, and used in an increasingly expanding vocabulary. It is clear that Josephine's love for education evolved from this family emphasis on learning.

Josephine was accepted into the very competitive New York State College for Teachers. Josephine used her state and local scholarships to buy her books and pay for her living expenses at Newman Hall. Totally self-supportive, she supplemented her income by waiting tables at various restaurants, serving as a photographer at John G. Myers Department Store, and working as a nanny during the summers. When it was pointed out to Josephine that she attended college at a time when most Italian American women were not encouraged to do so, her reply was, "To do anything else would not have made any sense to me."

Upon graduation, while she lived on Quail Street, she secured a job teaching seventh and eighth grade and high school social studies. Travel to the school was quite arduous in those days. She left that position to take a teaching job in Whitney Point near Binghamton, only to soon discover that Joe Sano had been discharged from the service and had returned to Albany.

Several years earlier, in 1941, as a college senior, Josephine had met Joe Sano at the Columbus Day Dinner Dance at the Sons of Italy. He had gone off to war. Josephine returned to Albany in 1945 to marry Joe and take a position in a school in Berne Knox, where she remained for 2 years. For many years following, Josephine and Joe raised their three boys: Joe, John, and Jim. Josephine substituted in schools in Albany and her husband worked as a letter carrier out of the Academy Station. When the children were older, Josephine returned to a full-time position teaching grade 8 social studies in School 19, a place she describes as "the best place to teach." After many years, she went to Hackett Junior High School where she taught grades 7 and 8.

Eventually Josephine's leadership skills were well-noted and she was selected as a delegate to the Albany Public Schools Teachers' Association. She served as President of APSTA for 10 years. During her tenure as President, she transformed the teachers' union from what she described as an "afternoon tea society" into a modern organization representing teachers. She also assisted greatly in helping the police and fire department unions get off the ground during the Corning years. Josephine was one of the founders of NYSUT and was later selected as a delegate to that organization. In 1980, she was elected as President of the Albany Central Federation of Labor (AFL-CIO) and served for 20 years. Josephine was the first woman in New York State to ever serve in that position.

At 92 Josephine is "doing amazingly well" and continues to read and keep up with current events. She is involved in the lives of her sons, her daughters-in-law, her 6 grandchildren, and her 3 great grandchildren. Her independent spirit and her love for education are imbued in all members of her family.

# **Election of Board Members**

According to our new By-Laws passed in December 2010, election to the Board of Directors will be held in November. Four seats will be available.

If you are interested in applying for one of these vacancies and can satisfy all of the following requisites, please submit your brief resumé to the IACC Office.

IACC By-Laws state that "each candidate for director shall satisfy the following requisites:

- Be at least 21 years of age
- Be a United States Citizen
- Be a voting member of the corporation in good standing
- Have at least one year as a member immediately preceding the election
- Never have been convicted of a felony
- Not be a full-time employee of the IACC

No director, including the past president, may be elected to serve two consecutive terms.

Directors shall not be eligible for re-election or appointment to the board for one year after they complete their term on the board.

Husbands and wives may not serve on the Board of Directors simultaneously."

## **Current Nominees For Board of Directors**

1. Joseph DeFronzo

Joseph holds a degree in Political Science and Romance Languages from Queens College and a master's degree in International Affairs from Columbia University. In 1995, Joe was appointed by Governor Pataki to the position of Director of the International Division of the New York State Economic Development Corporation. Again, in 1999, he was appointed as Director of Business Development for the NYS Thruway Authority. In addition, Joe owns a wine importing and distribution company. He has been involved in many community endeavors.

#### 2. Mary Jean Knowles Mary Jean (MJ) and her husband Earl joined IACC in 2011. Since then she has been very active

volunteering for the various functions held by IACC. She recently co-chaired the David Righeschi concert held at the Troy Music Hall. MJ has volunteered for other committees as well. MJ participates in the Women's Bocce League and Zumba lessons. Mary Jean currently volunteers her time on several different Not-for-Profit charitable events outside of IACC, most notably the Albany Wine & Dine for the Arts, where she serves as Secretary on the Board of Directors.

3. Maria Marchio

Maria Marchio has been a member of the IACC for seven years. During that time, she served as president of the Women's Bocce League for 2 years. She has supported many social events and has been responsible for the children's dancing and singing activities. She is a member of the Siamo Qui Mail Prep Team. In addition, Maria has previously served on the Board.

4. Sharon Patrei

Sharon Patrei, originally from Albany, moved to Syracuse with her husband as he studied to become an ear, nose and throat surgeon and allergist. She ran his office for many years while raising her two boys. During this time, Sharon volunteered at food pantries, the Ronald McDonald House, the middle and high schools, and the women's auxiliary at St. Joseph's Hospital. She is a member of the Siamo Qui Mail Prep Team. Sharon has previously served on the Board.

5. Robert Penna

Bob and his wife have been members of IACC since 2001 and have volunteered for the Festas. Bob served 13 years in the New York State Senate as staff member or chief of staff for 3 senators and recently published a book, *Nonprofit Outcomes Toolbox*. He is currently on the board of IAHFi.

6. Ron Richards

Ron has been an active member of the IACC for many years. He has served on the Festa committee, the pool committee, the pavilion committee and the bocce league. In addition, Ron has worked for the Columbus Day parade events. Continued from page 3 Josephine has earned many honors during her lifetime: In 2000 she was chosen by the Albany-Colonie Chamber of Commerce as one of 100 Women of Excellence for the Century. She received the Bread and Roses Award from Cornell. In 2006 she was presented with the Sandy Feldman Award for Outstanding Leadership from NYSUT. In 1998, at the dedication of the Mulaney House in Troy as a National Treasure, then Congressman Mike McNulty requested that Josephine introduce then First Lady Hillary Clinton. In October 2000, Josephine accepted a posthumous award for Kate Mulaney at the induction into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca Falls. Josephine said it was a thrilling opportunity to stand with so many great women. In 2010, she was inducted into the Albany City Schools' Hall of Fame. She considers her greatest accomplishment the fact that she has helped teachers to be recognized and treated with dignity. "I gave them courage. I gave them direction." Josephine says any success she has had has been because she has no hidden agenda and is not hesitant about speaking her mind if there is a chance to do some good. Her indomitable spirit is best summed up by one of her favorite and frequently quoted phrases she credits to former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, "It is better to live one day as a lion, than to live a lifetime as a chicken" Josephine Sano continues to inspire. What a treasure!

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# Halloween Bash By Christine Di Ionna



## *Rosemary-Garlic Roast Turkey*

Original Kaboose.com recipe by Stella Zedman

If Italians had invented roast turkey, it would turn out something like this. Wonderfully fragrant with garlic and rosemary, this savory roast turkey makes an impressive holiday feast that's sure to wow your guests.

#### Ingredients

- 8 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh rosemary (or 2 tbsp./30 mL dried)
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 Tbsp. coarse salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 12 to 15 lb. whole turkey, fully defrosted if frozen

#### **Cooking Instructions**

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.

- In a small bowl or food processor, mash together garlic, rosemary, olive oil, salt and pepper so that it forms a thick paste.
- By hand, gently pull the skin away from the turkey breast at the front of the breast (near the neck opening) to form a sort of pocket. Rub some of the rosemary garlic paste onto the breast meat under the skin, reaching in as far as you can without tearing the skin. Rub the remaining rosemary garlic paste all over the skin of the turkey and in the cavity. Add the stuffing, if you're using it, and place the turkey, breast side up, on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Tuck the wings underneath the bird and tie the legs together with kitchen string.
- Place the turkey into the preheated oven. Do not cover the pan. Roast, basting every 15 to 20 minutes with the pan juices, until a meat thermometer inserted into the inner thigh reaches 170 degrees F and the juices run clear when the thigh is pricked with a skewer. This will take anywhere from 3 to 4-1/4 hours (depending on the size of the turkey and whether it is stuffed or not). The only definite way to know if the turkey is cooked is by using a meat thermometer. Remove roasting pan from the oven and let the turkey rest at room temperature for about 15 minutes before carving.

Serve turkey with pan juices or use the juices to make gravy.

#### Rosemary-Garlic Gravy

- 1/4 cup fat from the roasting pan
- $1/4 \operatorname{cup} flour$

2 cups defatted turkey pan juices, turkey broth, water, or a combination

In a saucepan, combine the fat from the roasting pan and flour. Cook, stirring to eliminate any lumps, for just a minute or two. Whisk in turkey juices, broth or whatever liquid you're using and cook, stirring constantly, until the gravy thickens. Let simmer over low heat, whisking occasionally, for 6 to 8 minutes. Serve hot.

Servings: turkey: 12 to 18, gravy: 2-1/2 cups

#### How Kids Can Help

With clean hands, kids can help coat the turkey with the herb and garlic mixture. Older children (12 and up) can help stir the simmering gravy with adult supervision.
