



Finding Our Immigrant Ancestry by Angelo F. Coniglio

Popular Genealogy Sites - Familysearch.org

Previous columns have often referred to on-line sites that can be very helpful in genealogic research. There are dozens, if not hundreds, of such venues, and their offerings are updated constantly. One I've discussed frequently is 'familysearch', the Mormon site, which has recently made many changes.

The *Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints* Church (*LDS*, or Mormon), because of its reverence for ancestors and the belief that well-documented ancestry can help insure family togetherness in the hereafter, has had its



members travel the world and make microfilm photocopies of all manner of original records from the United States and dozens of other nations: civil birth, marriage and death records; church baptism, marriage and death records, and so on. These microfilms are available to anyone, for rental and viewing at LDS FamilySearch Centers (FSCs), located in a great number of communities worldwide, and also at certain public libraries. The LDS has begun to 'index' information from these records, and make their images available on-line for free.

Whether a researcher plans to rent microfilms or to avail oneself of the free on-line information, he or she should become familiar with the *LDS* genealogy site, https://familysearch.org/ (here called 'familysearch'). Readers may have become familiar with the 'old' http://www.familysearch.org, which has been phased out.

To use the new site, go to https://familysearch.org/. New users should immediately go to the upper right of the page, and click 'Sign In'. This will lead you to a page where you may click on 'Create a new account' and register for free, with a username and password you will have to remember for future use.

Once you've signed in, you'll see a colorful and somewhat 'busy' page with a number of options. A tempting choice is the one labeled 'Family Tree'. Unless you're an experienced researcher, I'd suggest you set that option aside until you know more about your ancestors, and about the process of developing a family tree. My strong suggestion is to click on the link titled 'Search' at the top of the page. This will bring you to another page, https://familysearch.org/search, with several options, and again you'll be presented with the opportunity to type in the first and last name of an ancestor and begin 'searching'. Again, resist the urge. Go to the bottom of the page, where you'll see this list under 'Browse by location':

Africa, Asia and Middle East, Australia and New Zealand, Canada, Caribbean, Central and South America, Continental Europe, Mexico, Pacific Islands, United Kingdom and Ireland, United States

Click on one of the choices, and you can then 'surf' for the country, state, province, county, town, etc. that you're interested in. You'll be presented with a list of the various types of documents for which images of original records are available on-line. These will be options for your search, but before continuing, consider the approach you must take if the locality of interest is not found in the listings of on-line records.

In that case, you must search to see whether the LDS has microfilms of documents that have not yet been 'indexed' for on-line access. To do so, go back to https://familysearch.org/search, but this time, click on the link titled 'Catalog'. Save this issue for future reference, and next time I'll review the LDS microfilm program.

The IACC Foundation Bookshelf

This article is the first in a series designed to inform IACC members about recent Italian themed books that may be of interest. Books will be selected and reviewed from a variety of genres, in an effort to appeal to a wide range of readers. The story of the Italian American experience has been told by a number of observers and participants. There is general agreement that the recent four-hour PBS documentary, *The Italian Americans*, is an excellent addition to that body of in-



formation. A companion book directly related to that series called *The Italian Americans: A History* by Maria Laurino (W.W. Norton & Company, 2015) develops the Italian American story more comprehensively than possible in televised episodes. The book is based on extensive research, but written in an easily accessible style and is richly illustrated.

A more specific history is Paul Moses' *An Unlikely Union: The Love-Hate Story of New York's Irish and Italians* (New York University Press, 2015). It is often the case that when an oppressed minority experiences success and then power, they often mistreat the next immigrant or racial group seeking similar social mobility. So it was in New York City when former Irish immigrants sought to prevent newly arrived Italians from gaining control of the streets, the trades, and the social and political institutions that run a city. Moses tells wonderful stories about the exaggerated personalities involved in those conflicts, and the role that interethnic dating and marriage played in weakening them. Contemporary Irish and Italian power sharing may be illustrated by the fact that Cardinal Timothy Dolan heads the Archdiocese of New York from one of the city's best known structures, Saint Patrick's Cathedral, while Mayor Bill de Blasio lives in Gracie Mansion, the mayor's official residence first occupied by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia. One in ten of New York City's residents are Irish or Italian, and they no longer are at war with each other. Paul Moses' book chronicles how this "unlikely union" came about.

There are books whose goals are to inform the general public and serve as a source of pride for specific ethnic groups, because they demonstrate the collective accomplishments of individuals from that group. A recent collection of outstanding books about Italian Americans fall into that category. Mark Rotella's *Amore: The Story of Italian American Song* (Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2010) is a heart-warming musical trip down memory lane for anyone growing up in the 1940s 1950s. Italian singers dominated radio and then television in that era. Frank Sinatra sold 150 million records in his career and appeared in several movies, winning an Oscar for his performance in *From Here to Eternity*. Many other singers shared the national stage with Sinatra including Perry Como, Tony Bennett, Vic Damone, and Connie Francis. Today almost every romantic comedy movie set in the 1950s and 1960s signals that time frame by including Dean Martin's version of *Volare*, the Grammy winning song of the year (1958) originally recorded by Domenico Modugno. Rotella's account of the personal histories of the singers and the significance of their songs is both comprehensive and engaging

For sports fans, two recent books describe the accomplishments of Italian Americans in great detail. The first is Lawrence Baldassaro's *Beyond DiMaggio: Italian Americans in Baseball* (University of Nebraska Press, 2013). Baldassaro describes the collective accomplishments Italian American baseball players beginning in the 1940s and culminating in the selection of Dr. A. Bartlett Giamatti as Commissioner of Baseball in the late 1980s. Di Maggio was the epitome of an elegant and accomplished Italian American. He played for the New York Yankees from 1936 to 1951 (except for a two year stint in the Air Force). The Yankees won eleven American League pennants during his years as a player and DiMaggio was an All Star every year of his career. His hitting streak of 56 games in 1941 still stands 74 year later. His teammates, Phil Rizzuto and Yogi Berra were equally well known and carried on Yankee dominance after Di-Maggio retired. There were other well-known Italian American players: Cookie Lavagetto's; Al Gionfriddo; Tommy Lasorda; Sal Maglie, and many more.

What Baldassaro did for Italians in baseball, Rolando Vitale does for boxing through his book *The Real Rockys: A History of the Golden Age of Italian Americans in Boxing, 1900-1955* (RV Publishing, 2014). Of course, the "Rocky" in the title is Rocky Marciano, the Heavyweight Champion who retired with an undefeated 49-0 record. This feat has not been matched by any other champion fighter. Like DiMaggio, Marciano was a unique, record-setting Italian American who unconsciously raised the positive visibility of an entire ethnic group. Other Italian American boxers also achieved fame and some notoriety. Three examples are Jake LaMotta, Rocky Graziano, and from Canastota, NY, Carmine Basilio. It was Basilio's prominence that was influential in the decision to locate the International Boxing Hall of Fame in his hometown. Singers, boxers, and baseball players were part of the many developments that helped move Italian Americans from an immigrant group to a social class status comparable to other ethnic groups. Indeed, all the books in this review chronicle some aspect of that progressive change.



Louisiana Seafood Boil

Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 bottle or can of beer,
 12-16 oz., nothing too strong
- 3 Tablespoons seafood boil seasoning (Old Bay Seasoning)
- 1 lemon, cut in half
- 2 pounds medium red potatoes (about 8) ,halved
- 1 large onion, peeled and quartered
- 2 pounds of kielbasa, quartered
- 6 ears corn-on-the-cob, peeled and halved
- 24 littleneck clams, scrubbed
- 2 pounds of snow crab legs, frozen
- 2 pounds jumbo (21-25 count)
 peeled and deveined
- Chopped fresh parsley for garnish

Method:

In a very large pot lined with a steam basket insert (at least 10 quarts), if you don't have a steam basket its ok, combine 8 cups water, beer, spice mix, lemons, salt, kielbasa, potatoes and onion. Cover and bring to a boil over high heat; boil until potatoes just begin to become tender when pierced with a knife, about 10 minutes. Remove lid and layer in corn, clams, shrimp and crab legs (crab should be on the top). Reduce heat to medium-high. Cover pot and cook until clams open and shrimp are just cooked through, about 20 minutes.

Line a table with newspaper, craft paper or large brown paper bags. Pull out the seam basket and dump the contents on the table. If not using a steam basket remove using a slotted spoon to the table or onto a large platter. (Discard any clams that do not open.)

Pour a few cups of the liquid from the pot over seafood and lightly sprinkle with parsley. Serve with hot drawn butter, cocktail sauce and spicy mustard.

Election of Board Members
